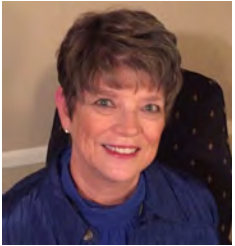

**Lena Bateman, Deep South Region, *Get Back to Nature, DSGC!*** The Deep South Unified Project is Native Plants, Litter Control and Youth.

★ **States in the Region:** Alabama, Florida, Georgia, Louisiana, Mississippi, Tennessee

★ **What makes your Region different from others?** We are in the Deep South, literally, with parts of four of our states as sub-tropical regions affected by the Gulf of Mexico. Alabama, on the Gulf Coast, has mountainous ridges and deep valleys with foothills of the Appalachians. It is known as the only state with all of the natural resources needed to make iron and steel and the largest supplier of steel and pipe. Florida is renowned for its amusement parks, orange crops, winter vegetables and the Kennedy Space Center. It is the flattest state in the USA. Juan Ponce de Leon named the state in tribute to Spain's Easter celebration known as "Pascua Florida" or Feast of Flowers. Georgia is the country's top producer of pecans, peanuts and Vidalia onions. Georgia is known for authors Alice Walker and Margaret Mead along with musicians and bands Ray Charles and R.E.M. Louisiana is famous for its festivals: New Orleans Jazz & Heritage Festival, Bayou Country Superfest and Mardi Gras. Louisiana does not have counties; it has 64 parishes. Lake Pontchartrain Causeway is the world's longest bridge over a body of water. Mississippi is known for its beautiful magnolia trees. It is home to Elvis Presley, Oprah Winfrey, William Faulkner, Tennessee Williams, B.B. King and Jimmy Buffett. Root beer was invented in Biloxi in 1898. Tennessee is the heart of country music. Named for the Yuchi word, "Tana-see," it means Meeting Place. Nashville is home to the longest running live radio show in the world "The Grand Ole Opry."

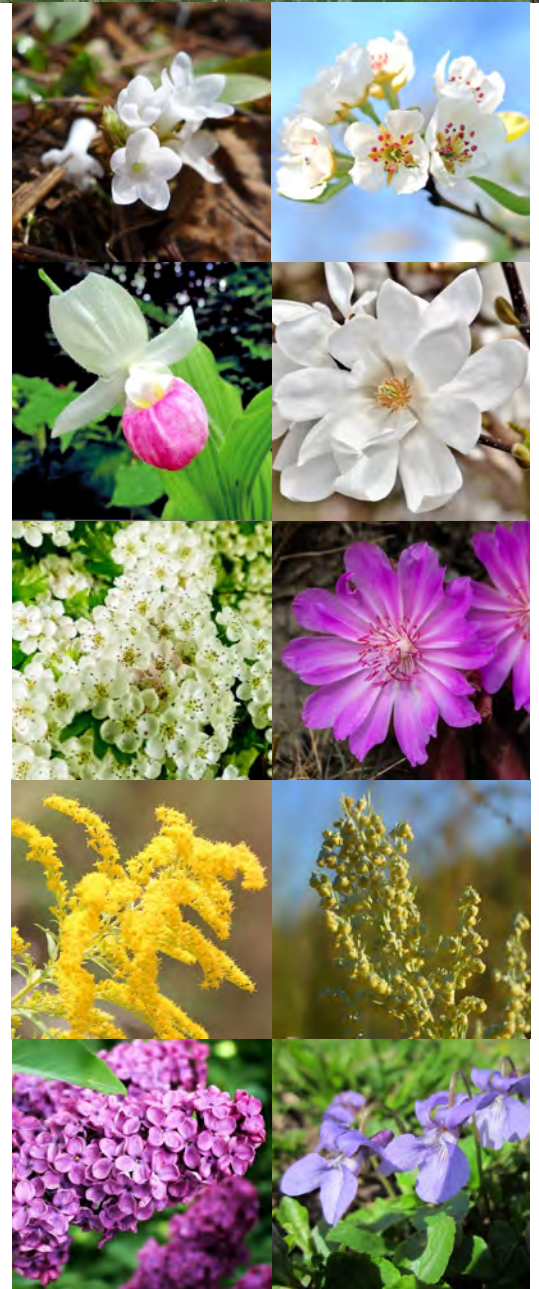

**Suzanne Bushnell, New England Region, Planting the New England Victory Garden!** All six states in the NEGC are being asked to help fight food insecurity in New England. Individual members and clubs are reporting (using an online donation form on our NEGC website) the amount of fresh fruit, vegetables, herbs, flowers, etc. that they donate during the growing season to organizations that distribute food.

The reporting can be done by weight, servings, or value. Organizations include food pantries, soup kitchens, senior centers, schools, and even food trucks.

- ★ **States in the Region:** Connecticut, Maine, Massachusetts, New Hampshire, Rhode Island, Vermont
- ★ **What makes your Region different from others?** The six New England states stretch all the way from the mountains of Vermont to the Canadian border and to the sea. Five of our six states have part of their border on the Atlantic Ocean. So, we have a range of growing zones (according to the USDA zone map). The zones range from the coldest, 3B near the Maine border with Canada, to 7A along parts of the coast of Connecticut and Rhode Island. New Englanders are known for their toughness and individuality. I have found, since moving here 26 years ago, that they are also a very welcoming group.
- ★ **What is the most daring thing you have ever done?** When I was single in the early 1980's and worked for a company in Washington, D.C. that had overseas operations in Asia, I traveled to Hong Kong by myself. While there I took a train trip over the border to Mainland China for the day. One of the stops was at a restaurant where the "bathroom" was literally a hole in the ground. It was a very "enlightening" trip!
- ★ **Anything Else?** My region is blessed to have all four seasons with beautiful perennial gardens from spring to fall. We then have the beauty of the fall foliage season throughout New England which people travel from all over the world to see.

California, with their large numbers, is asked to install, or refurbish, five markers each year. “Let’s Bring ‘em Back In” focuses on developing

resource materials to reconnect with clubs that have not disbanded but have left our federations.

★ **States in the Region:** Alaska, Arizona, California, Hawaii, Idaho, Nevada, Oregon, Washington

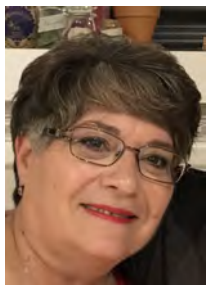

★ **Countries in NGCIA Region 2:** Costa Rica, El Salvador, Guatemala, Honduras, Panama

★ **Countries in NGCIA Region 3:** Argentina, Brazil, Chile, Colombia, Ecuador, Peru, Uruguay, Venezuela

★ **What makes your Region different from others?** The 229 Inter-

national Affiliate clubs are located in 14 countries with great diversity in culture, geography and climate - mountains to seashores, rainforests to deserts.

★ **Anything else?** Do you know that NGC has a committee called Comité de Actividades de Afiliados Internacionales or COMAAI (Committee of International Affiliate Activities) that efficiently manages three International Affiliated (IA) Garden Club regions in Mexico, Central and South America? Since 2012, COMAAI has developed an internet network with a website as an active communication center and serves as an educational tool, sponsors an online Gardening School and extends IA digital accreditations.

The International Affiliates are active in social media with Twitter and a Facebook page. The page promotes three Study Groups focusing on floral design, horticulture, conservation and our NGC Plant America project. This international networking system promotes NGC objectives in Latin America and the success of the Plant America project clearly defines the importance of our international networking. For more information visit the website [comaai.com](http://comaai.com), Facebook Comaai Clubes de Jardines Internacionales and the Groups: Grupo Comaai Diseño Floral, Grupo Comaai Horticultura y Conservación and Grupo Comaai Plant America.

As International Affiliate Schools Liaison, I believe that NGC Schools also are a binding force that unifies the international regions, serving as a source of continuous education where the IA can become NGC Judges or Consultants. At the Schools, IA members obtain the knowledge and ability to serve as volunteers in their communities across the American continent. Still NGC is miles apart from its International Affiliate Clubs and factors including different languages, politics and cultural diversity can sometimes create misunderstandings, such as delays in paying dues. However, international networking has efficiently helped to erase all frontiers, for NGC members are interested in the bettering our communities, teaching our youth about gardening and floral design while finding methods to protect our Earth. ## ALMA PACHECO MEMORIAL GARDEN

From the fall of 2017 through 2019 a series of volunteer events took place to prepare the Alma Pacheco Memorial Garden site at Mt. Hood Community College (MHCC) in Gresham, Oregon. Three hundred and twenty-nine volunteer hours went into this project to remove 500 square feet of stubborn, invasive English Ivy followed by planting the garden with native, pollinator friendly plants and seed.

Alma Pacheco, born in El Salvador, grew up in Portland and was a student at Mount Hood Community College from 2011 to 2015. During her time at MHCC, Alma held active positions on campus including student government president. Alma passed away suddenly in 2016, though she left a legacy behind. Her love of nature, community and MHCC led to the idea of creating Alma's memorial garden - a space for students and the community to enjoy.

The Powell Valley Garden Club supported this project by collaborating with the Sandy River Watershed Council on applying for and being awarded the 2019-2020 Plant America Grant. This funding has brought the project to completion. During the final volunteer event on December 7, 2019, volunteers weeded the garden, sowed a native wildflower seed mix and planted native shrubs. ### Recycled Shipping Container Farm Uses 99% Less Water

Young entrepreneurs are changing the face of farming on a city street corner in New England. Shawn and Connie Cooney of Corner Stalk Farm are practicing Controlled Environment Agriculture (CEA) on a street corner in East Boston, MA. Five years ago, they retrofitted old shipping containers with red and green LED grow lights. They added temperature and humidity controls. They now farm hydroponically 365 days a year regardless of the weather outside.

In contrast to traditional farming, they save enormous amounts of land and water. By hanging plants in 10-foot tall columns, they grow an acre's worth of lettuce in 320 square feet! For every 1000 plants, they amazingly use a mere 25 gallons of water per week compared with about 1,000 gallons. The environmental benefits do not end there. Because their market is limited to their immediate area, their carbon footprint for shipping is minimal. Although technically not organic because their plants do not grow in soil, they use organic practices including Integrated Pest Management with ladybugs as their number one pest defense. Best of all for their avid customers, they sell delicious heirloom varieties of lettuce with their roots still attached so the plants keep growing until the moment they are enjoyed with very little waste.



# Healing Gardens

Healing Gardens are passive in contrast to Therapy Gardens yet they provide healing of the mind and body, too! They provide a place for tranquility, reflection and hope. Therapy Gardens are generally part of a treatment program for occupational, physical or horticultural therapy.

How do you feel when you hear the chirp of a little bird or the babbling sounds of water, feel a slight breeze on a hot day, see shadows cast on the ground as the sun peeks through tree limbs, smell the fragrance of a crab apple tree or lush soil after a spring shower? Now there is evidence based research that shows that being in touch with nature is uplifting...healing!

Throughout the centuries, the healing powers of nature have been touted. Doctors would prescribe time in the countryside for those who were sickly. Psychiatric patients appeared calmer after working in hospital fields and gardens. This continued until the 1930's when manmade medicines took the front row seat and keeping close to nature was no longer the trend. Then in 1984, Robert Ulrich, Ph.D., did a study of two groups of patients who underwent the same type of surgery. He discovered that the group who looked out upon nature healed much quicker, needed less medication, had fewer complications and had a greater positive attitude than the group who looked out onto a brick wall. Since that eye opening study and others, Ulrich has influenced the designs of healthcare facilities to include gardens and green space. Designs are such that public spaces inside a building connect with the outdoors. Patient rooms have windows that look out onto green expanses. This trend to connect with nature benefits the patients, family members, visitors and hospital staff.

Additional research shows viewing plants or scenes of nature can lower blood pressure, moderate heart activity, and decrease muscle tension in as little as five minutes. Other research shows that about thirty minutes spent in nature daily will 'reboot' the brain. People are more empathetic and kinder. As NGC members, we need to consider more and more to help make healing or therapy gardens a reality in hospitals, hospices, rehabilitation centers, nursing homes, assisted living spaces, and even schools.

# A Touch of Spring ~ Presenters



## Nancy Aten

Nancy Aten, PLA, ASLA is a landscape architect practicing ecological restoration and conservation planning at her firm, Landscapes of Space in Wisconsin, and serves as a consulting landscape architect for The Clearing in Ellison Bay, Door County. Nancy is a notable expert on the work of Jens Jensen. She will introduce us to Jensen's design ex-

perience and key threads to his approach, as they are understood today and implemented at the Clearing, a Folk School in Ellison Bay, a place thought to be his masterpiece. Nancy has an MS of Landscape Architecture with distinction from the University of Georgia, an earlier MS from Stanford University and a BS from the UW-Milwaukee.



## John Berges

Dr. Berges earned his PhD in Biological Oceanography from the University of British Columbia and did his postdoctoral work at Brookhaven National Laboratory. He lectured at Queen's University Belfast before becoming a Professor in both the Department of Biological Sciences and the School of Freshwater Sciences at UW-Milwaukee. His presentation will include an over-

view of fresh-waters on our planet, their rarity and importance, current threats to freshwaters and our Great Lakes in particular. He will include information on our International Joint Commission and the important roles community involvement plays in freshwater ecology.



## Shirley Dommer Waleczak

Shirley is the Garden Director for Boerner Botanical Gardens. She received her BS from UW River Falls in Agronomy and Horticulture. She brings over 34 years of experience in public horticulture management including overseeing garden collections and resources, supervising staff and volunteers, offering professional development, repre-

senting public agencies within the media and directing fiscal operations. The gardens feature formal gardens, one of the largest crab apple gardens in Wisconsin, a rose display garden with over 500 roses, individual gardens including herbs, annuals, shrubs, dillies and peonies.

Radler graduated from the UW-Madison with a BA in Landscape Architecture and spent the next 26 years with the Milwaukee County Park System, 13 years of which was as the Director of Boerner Botanical Gardens. He now pursues his passion for rose and plant breeding full-time. In 2002, Will formed Rose Innovations, LLC that focuses on research and development, education and philanthropy. He has authored the booklet *Rose Growing Simplified*, currently out of print, and co-authored the book, *Rose Gardening*, available but out of print. Will is featured in several other books focusing on roses.



## Chris Schultz

Chris is a Certified Public Manager (CPM) earning his credentials thru the University of Wisconsin in 2010. In 2019, he earned his Envision Sustainability Professional credential thru the Institute for Sustainable Infrastructure. He is a Senior Project Manager in the Planning, Re-
