Awards Program Update By Awards Task Force

The Awards Task Force has almost completed its review and revision of the CGCI Awards Program. The changes undertaken at this time are not major and most are enhancements of existing awards. There are still a few items to finalize but following is a summary of the progress to date:

- Awards that had NO entries or only one or two over the past five (5) years were eliminated. These include C-3 Restoration/Reforestation Fund Promotion; PR-1 Publicity Press Books; PR-6 Video; and the following Youth Awards: Y6, Y7, Y8, Y10, Y11, Y12, Y13, Y14. The sponsors of these awards have selected other awards to support.
- There were several awards that overlapped and/or had the same sponsor. It was decided to combine where possible and have one award with sub-sections or classes instead of multiple awards. For example: C-9, C-13 & C-14 (Bird & Butterfly Conservation and Butterfly Garden awards) were combined into one renamed "Pollinator Education Award." The updated award now has four sections and the dollar amount has been increased to \$50-1st and \$20-2nd in all sections.
- At the suggestion of several sponsors the dollar amount of their awards was increased or an award was divided into sections or classes to allow for additional recipients YAY! More blue ribbons!
- Awards Manual format:
 - ♦ The numbering of the awards was changed to mirror NGC. They use numbers only, no letters.
 - ♦ The "non-competitive" awards were renamed "Merit Awards." All awards that do not require recommendations, applications or entry forms are now listed under Merit Awards.
- The Task Force attempted to clarify, simplify or enhance the language of the rules and the individual award descriptions. In many cases the descriptions/requirements for NGC-eligible awards, did not conform to NGC's requirements and have now been updated.
 - All Evaluation Forms were updated to reflect the changes.
 - The "draft" Awards Manual 2017-18 will be available at the 2017 Convention. It will be posted to the website along with the updated Evaluation Forms following the convention.

"G" Is For Gaillardias and Gazanias By Judy Paul, Red Bluff Garden Club

Since I love both Gaillardias and Gazanias, and they have many similarities, I decided to write about them together. Both are included in the Asteraceae family. Gaillardia x grandiflora, commonly known as Blanket flower, is native to North and South America, with over two dozen different species. Gazania rigens is native to South Africa. Both are perennial plants, somewhat short lived. So after two or three years you may want to start over with new plants. Gaillardia will self-seed under good conditions. Gazanias can be propagated with basal cuttings.

Gaillardias grow well in zones 3 - 10. Gazanias prefer zones 9 - 11. Both like sunny locations, and once established, are quite drought tolerant as well as handling less than perfect soil conditions. They grow in a spreading, mounding form about a foot or more wide and one to two feet tall. You can use them in garden borders, container planting, or in a ground cover area. Blooming is nearly continuous from early summer through the fall. Deadheading the spent blooms will encourage more blooming.

The flowers on Gaillardia are boldly colored, mostly in reds and yellows of various color formations depending on the variety. The petals surround a center disk with the bloom size of 3 to 5 inches. The blooms can be prolific, thickly covering the plant with a "blanket" look—hence it's common name of Blanket Flower.



Gazanias bloom in a wider range of colors, red, yellow, orange, pink, white, and twotoned variations. The blooms are really spectacular with an almost striped appear-



ance on many varieties. These blooms do close at night. As with Gaillardias, they will continue blooming with regular deadheading of old blooms. I read that a common name for Gazanias is Treasure flower, which seems fitting for such an outstanding, vibrant flower show.

Both of these showy flowers are fairly low maintenance. They need regular watering until established, then can withstand more dry periods. They will be attractive to birds and butterflies. The Gaillardia is a food source of the Lepidoptera species of butterflies, as well as being somewhat deer resistant. They will need dividing every 2-3 years. As mentioned earlier, they will be more attractive with some regular grooming and deadheading to encourage optimal growth and show. And of course, this is

really true of every flower in your gardens.

I would recommend these flowers for an easy care and very showy area of your sunny garden. They would be good for beginner gardeners as they are quite easy to grow and care for. Life is a garden, so DIG it!




