From the President's desk...

CGCI Fall Board Meeting - September 11-14, Auburn CA

The Call has been distributed and all forms and information are also available on the CGCI website (http://californiagardenclubs.com/nextmeeting). The deadline for discounted "early registration" is **August 8** and NO registration will be accepted August 22 or later. The cutoff date for the hotel special rate is August 10. Don't delay! Register and reserve NOW.

The following amendments to the CGCI Bylaws were adopted at the 2018 convention and are effective immediately:

1. Article VII – Board of Directors
 Sec. 4. Change 3rd sentence. Thirty (30) Forty-five (45) days' notice of the fall and winter board meetings shall be given.

Strike Thirty (30) and Insert Forty-five (45)

Rationale: 30 days does not allow enough time when most hotel deadlines are 21 to 30 days before meetings to obtain special room rate. Time is limited when the Call arrives during summer while on vacation or during holidays. 45-day notice allows adequate time to make reservations needed for both fall and winter board meetings. **Motion Passed (two thirds vote).**

• 2. Article XII – FINANCES

Section 6.(d)

Pacific Region director's reimbursement of up to \$1,500.00 **\$2,000.00** annually for verified expenses when **the director is** from California.

Strike \$1,500.00 and Insert \$2,000.00 and the director is

Rationale: Directors expenses have increased for hotel stays and flights since the last director was from California. **Motion Passed (two thirds vote).**

Items #3 and #4 considered in seriatim. Article XIV- Board of Trustees

• 3. **New Sec. 9.** The Board of Trustees shall be responsible for the monthly internal financial review.

Add Sec. 9

Rationale: It insures the ongoing monthly review of CGCI financial records.

• 4. **New Sec. 10.** The Board of Trustees shall be responsible for collecting and maintaining Important CGCI documents.

Add Sec. 10

Rationale: CGCl's important papers need to be centralized and updated as necessary. **Motion Passed (two thirds vote).**

• 5. Article XX- Amendments

Sec. 3 Insert as last sentence. Sec. 3 Proposed amendments shall be submitted to the board of directors for recommendation at the winter board meeting before being submitted to the voting membership. **Written notice of proposed changes shall be distributed at least one week prior to the meeting.**

Rationale: Members of the Board of Directors should have advance notice of the proposed bylaws amendments to allow adequate time for study and preparation to vote at winter board. When handed the proposed amendments as one walks in the door and then be asked to vote on changes with no time to review may not result in good decisions being made for the organization. Sec. 1 of this article requires all voting members at convention shall have been sent a copy of proposed amendments with rationale. The same requirement should apply to winter board for members of the board of directors. **Motion Passed (two thirds vote).**

Anza-Borrego Desert State Park By Nancy Lee Loesch, Chairman



Borrego is Spanish for bighorn sheep. The park is home to about 600 bighorn sheep. The size of the park is more than ANZA-BORREGO 630,000 acres and it is one of the largest state parks in the

United States. Elevations in the park range from 6,000 feet to 15 feet above sea level. In 2012 CGCI resolved to donate \$15,000 to Anza-Borrego Desert State Park for upgrades to the park Visitor Center. The restricted fund currently has \$531.89. To meet this obligation \$6,400 is needed. CGCI is dependent on donations to fulfill the commitment.

Sally Theriault, State Park Interpreter, notes there are two current needs for the Visitor Center, more desert plants and a new walkway lighting system. Following is an excerpt of a proposal for the walkway lighting system:

New light fixtures along the paved walkway from the parking lot to the Visitor

- should be dark-sky friendly, in keeping with the designation as an International Dark Sky Park
- should be fully shielded, so that light is directed only downward, not up or out to the side
- brightness should be only what is needed to light the walkway, and preferablv amber

Option 1: use the existing posts and simply install new fixtures onto them. This would be simplest, fastest, and least expensive. Purchasing Amber LED fixtures, one for each existing post and installed by park maintenance staff, would be approximately \$5,746.

Option 2: buy and install new posts and fixtures. The estimate for 55 lights and posts is approximately \$8,000. This option takes into consideration the possibility of adding posts and fixtures plus rewiring and labor.

CGCI has supported this project for many years and the park continues to have needs that our donations can help solve. This chairman will continue to monitor the situation.

PLANT AMERICA Grants Available for 2018-2019 Providing Financial Support to Club Projects

National Garden Clubs, Inc. grant program for clubs entitled PLANT AMERICA Community Project Grants has a simple application process. The purpose of the grant program is to provide financial support for new or existing club projects in their respective communities all across the United States.

Individual garden clubs that are members of National Garden Clubs, Inc. may apply for funds up to \$1,000 for the direct expenses of projects. Clubs that received a PLANT AMERICA grant for 2017-2018 are not eligible to apply again. The deadline for applications is October 15, 2018. Recipients of grants will be notified, and all money will be awarded by January 31, 2019. Projects must be completed by February 28, 2020, and final report forms are due by April 1, 2020.

Project Eligibility

Projects submitted may be a joint venture with another organization/s. The scope of these projects in communities may include:

- Beautification and/or restoration
- Community gardens
- School gardens/classrooms
- Landscaping for Habitat for Humanity Homes
- Landscaping of Blue Star Memorial Markers
- Implementation of environmental practices
- A horticulture or environmental educational event for the public

Sempervirens Fund Update Rosa Radicchi, Chairman

The Sempervirens Fund is proud to announce that the Great Park Campaign has been completed. The Campaign raised **\$22 million over four years** and enabled Sempervirens Fund to permanently protect more than 9,200 acres in the Santa Cruz Mountains. But the vision for a Great Park remains: to re-establish a beautiful, healthy redwood forest between Silicon Valley and the Pacific Ocean.



Other highlights:

January 17, 2018: Sempervirens Fund announced it had acquired Cotoni-Coast Ridge, a strategically important 106-acre parcel north of the town of Davenport, on the coast of Santa Cruz County. Situated on the westernmost ridgeline of the Santa Cruz Mountain range above Scott Creek Beach, Cotoni-Coast Ridge ranges in elevation from 400 to 1,000 feet and is an ecologically diverse property consisting primarily of second-growth redwoods, as well as coastal terrace prairie, coastal mixed hardwood, and coastal scrub. Most importantly, the pie-shaped parcel connects San Vicente Redwoods, the Bureau of Land Management's Cotoni-Coast Dairies National Monument, and Cal Poly's Swanton Pacific Ranch. In all, these properties total more than 17,500 acres.

March 23-25, 2018: Sempervirens Fund volunteers, the Amah Mutsun Land Trust Native Stewardship Corps and members of the Muwekma Ohlone joined forces to plant an ethnobotanical demonstration garden at Castle Rock State Park's new Robert C. Kirkwood entrance.

April 30, 2018: With the help of nearly 100 dedicated and hardworking volunteers over two weekends, Sempervirens Fund planted 200 black oak trees and did a variety of other stewardship projects at the site of the new Robert C. Kirkwood Entrance to Castle Rock State Park. Thanks to these incredible people, future generations will walk, relax and picnic beneath the towering crowns of majestic black oak.

June 6, 2018: The Clean Water and Parks Act (Proposition 68) passed with roughly 56 percent of the vote. A major contributor to the Yes on 68 Coalition, Sempervirens Fund is grateful Californians have voted to infuse California State Parks with much-needed funds to ensure our public lands are safe, accessible to all and properly managed. For 118 years, Sempervirens Fund and California State Parks have partnered to help protect some of the most valuable natural resources in the state. The passage of Proposition 68 is a long overdue investment in California's public gems.

Saturday, September 29, 2018: Castle Rock 50th Anniversary Celebration: In 1968, Sempervirens Fund helped establish Castle Rock State Park. Today, the park encompasses 5,242 acres, boasts 34 miles of trail and contains some of the best bouldering routes in California.



Since our founders began in 1900, **Sempervirens Fund** has protected more than 34,000 acres of redwood forest. We hold in our hearts and minds the founders' experience of what thrived here – and what can be restored through proper **stewardship**. Like our founders, we work passionately to protect, connect and restore the redwood forests into a vast and vibrant landscape that can support people and wildlife for countless generations to come.
