Award #3. CIVIC DEVELOPMENT AWARD - To clubs

1st place \$50 in each section.

Section A. Small club, 50 or less members

For civic beautification, roadside improvement, cleanup activities, or other worthwhile community beautification projects. Submit a written report with supporting evidence such as photographs, letters of appreciation or publicity.

Sponsor may not change placement or amount of money awarded.

Award #27. UNIQUE BACKYARD ENHANCEMENT AWARD - To individuals

For a backyard/garden which has been enhanced by the addition of unique items such as a greenhouse, aviary, aquaponics, rainwater collection barrels etc. All water features must be water-recirculating. The application must include photographs of the enhancements.

Sponsor may determine number of placements to be paid and amount for each.

Award #51. PUBLICATIONS

Section 1. Published Article by an Individual. (This award has been reformatted) Article published during the awards year which must be on one of the following three topics:

Promotion of the objectives/or an objective of CGCI, PR or NGC. Flower design. Horticulture.

Only one entry per person. Entries may be published in Golden Gardens eNews. Sponsor may determine number of placements to be paid and amount for each.

Award #51. PUBLICATIONS

Section 2 - Other publications, to clubs, Class A: Membership: Brochure, leaflet Printed publication or publication prepared for electronic distribution are acceptable. Sponsor may determine number of placements to be paid and amount for each.

Award #62. YOUTH POETRY CONTEST - To individuals in grades K-9 Title for poem determined annually by NGC

Sponsor may determine amount for each grade, previous award was \$10 per grade



"Potted Candle Planter"

Looking for something new for your summer patio? These planters look great on their own – but can also be converted into a stylish lighting option for your garden by using a simple trick. Fill bottom of pot with about 1-2 inches of soil and drop a smaller



pot inside (about 1-2-inches smaller in diameter). Make sure you've added enough soil to the larger pot to make the rims even with each other. Fill center pot with pea gravel and surround it with soil. Place plants in the outer ring of soil. Place candle in gravel and cover with a glass hurricane.

From the President's desk...

Thank you Adele Kelly, 2019 Winter Board Meeting Chairman, and the volunteers of Palomar District for hosting a memorable meeting filled with Fiesta Fun, good food, hands-on workshops and educational programs and for sharing with us a bit of what makes your district special and unique. Somehow, you even managed to provide a truly rare experience...rain in San Diego. While driving home from San Diego, it was encouraging to see standing water in areas that are usually dusty and dry. And there were sightings of five rainbows. When was the last time you saw five rainbows in one day?

In the Chico area, the fire scar from the Camp Fire was obvious but for a different reason than one might think. The foothills normally are covered with seasonal grasses that dry out quickly leaving dried brown stubble for most of the year. Last November, some areas of the brown stubble were burned leaving black ash. With the rains, the hills are turning green and the areas of black ash are now covered in lush green seasonal grasses, so much brighter than the areas that were not touched by fire.

As April approaches it is encouraging to see winter crops growing so fast it seems like if you stopped along the road, you could watch them grow. The crops and wild mustard are thriving in the wet weather. Wild mustard is planted as a cover crop for nematode or weed control/suppression and even when the fields are no longer seeded each year, the wild mustard reseeds itself for years to come. Never do I remember seeing such a wonderful display of the bright yellow plants growing wild along miles and miles of roads. The beautiful, clear, blue sky and fields of yellow with the backdrop of the Sierra Nevada foothills is only a minute hint of the natural beauties of California. There is much for which we may be thankful. I wonder what sights await us next week as we travel to Van Nuys for the 2019 Convention of Pacific Region Garden Clubs, Inc.

As we enjoy the lush green of our state this spring, the wildflowers appearing in masses and the California poppies opening as they catch the brief patches of sun between the clouds, please take time to remember that conservation of water in California is important every day, yes, even when it is raining, and every year even when we have flooding or when the levels of our reservoirs rise. When garden clubs are diligent in consistently providing the same water conservation message, in wet times as well as drought, we can make a difference. May your soil still be damp when it is time to pull the weeds.

Email Voting By Greg Pokorski, CGCI Parliamentarian

Email meetings/email voting is a means of taking action on an issue without conducting an actual meeting where all attendees can see and hear what is going on. Robert's Rules frowns on email meetings and email voting, but allows them if included in an organization's bylaws. But Robert's also states that organizations must follow local, state and federal law. This officer reported at a CGCI meeting that email voting is illegal in California according to the California Corporations Code (CCC). Some clubs are incorporated. Many or most are not. The CCC does not apply at all to unincorporated organizations, so this does not apply to many of our member clubs.

There are no reports that any of our clubs do email voting, and no reason for any club to do so because clubs generally meet frequently enough that there should be little urgent business that must be dealt with prior to the next scheduled meeting. This should not be a concern for most of our clubs.

If this does apply to your organization, be aware that there is some exception to the above prohibition, but there are cumbersome provisions required in order to take action (vote etc.) which may be taken at any regular or special meeting without actually having a meeting - these involve advance notice, unanimous consent, and recording consent in See: https://www.adlercolvin.com/blog/2012/12/06/can-a-californiathe minutes. nonprofit-board-vote-by-email/.

So, it is in fact possible to take action without having an actual meeting but if you are a corporation and are going to do that you should learn the requirements. Contact me for more information if this is a concern for your organization. It is my belief that these complex exception requirements serve as a further deterrent to using email voting.

Ames Tools Grants

National Garden Clubs, Inc.'s partnership with The Ames Companies, Inc. began in 2014. The Ames Companies, the largest manufacturer of garden tools in the U.S., has generously agreed to extend its in-kind grant program for 2019. This year's list of tools that may be requested includes a group of tools sized for children and a group of lighter weight and mid-sized tools (indicated as floral tools) which may be helpful for use in garden therapy projects. Most of these tools were introduced into the program in 2018. Ames has set aside \$4,500 (retail value) in garden tools available for local community gardening projects during the 2019 calendar year.

NGC local member clubs are eligible to apply for a grant of Ames tools for gardening projects performed or supported by the club which are scheduled to be carried out March 1 -September 30, 2019. Projects may be a joint venture with another organization, however the garden club applying must be a member of NGC. Awarded tools will be shipped to the successful applicants about two weeks following their notification as grant recipients.

NGC's Gardening Schools By Greg Pokorski, Chairman

Following glowing reports and rave reviews for the NGC Environmental School, Course 1 and 2 in January and before it hosts Course 3 and 4 in July, the club stepped up and offered to host California's next Gardening School. Mark your calendars and save the dates: Course 1: January 20-21, 2020, Course 2: January 22-23, 2020, Course 3: July 13-14, 2020, Course 4: July 15-16, 2020. All classes will be held at the Living Coast Discovery Center in Chula Vista.

This Gardening School will be the 26th series in California since 1979. Any CGCI club or district may sponsor any NGC School. NGC provides the infrastructure for these educational programs and the CGCI chairman serves as liaison between the sponsoring organization and NGC to assist with the administration of the school. A new Handbook and new forms to be used for Environmental, Gardening and Landscape Design Schools will soon be available. Much information about the program is available on the CGCI and NGC websites and information is regularly provided in *The National Gardener*, the official NGC publication, and in the *Council Thymes*, the newsletter of the California Consultants Council.

This school is intended to help both novice and experienced gardeners become accomplished horticulturists. Classes include basic botany, soils, plant propagation, diseases and pests, growing fruits, vegetables, flowers, trees, lawns, lawn alternatives and a supplemental subject in each course that can specifically address local interests. Anyone can attend the courses, but garden club members who complete the series and pass the optional tests may become NGC Gardening Consultants.

Sponsoring a Gardening School can increase the visibility of your club or district (and CGCI) by providing a valuable educational service to garden club members and the public. A School can attract new members, be a potential fundraiser, and provide a great team project for your organization. One Gardening School is not enough. It would be great to provide this opportunity in different parts of our large state. Come to Chula Vista in January and see how this might work for your club or district.

Making a Difference through the Penny Pines Program By Nancy Compton, River Valley Garden Club and Carol Vallens, CGCI Penny Pines Chairman

The recent wildfires at both ends of our beautiful state have ravaged families, homes, businesses, animals, and forests as they mowed down anything and everything in their destructive path. As we smelled the fire and choked on the acrid air, our hearts ached for those who lost everything. During and after a disaster, we long to reach out and help one another as best we can. Although we desperately want to help, we often don't know what to do. How can we, as individuals, possibly make a difference in the face of disasters so overwhelming? The answer is: each of us can make a difference, and we can do this by contributing to a reforestation effort that has been a major player in rebuilding California's forests since 1941 – the Penny Pines program.

When the program began, seedlings could be produced for about one cent each, and 680 seedlings were used to plant one acre of forest. Thus, for a total of \$68, seedlings for ten acres could be purchased. Site preparation and planting costs were met through regular Forest Service funding. Over the years, more than one million dollars have been donated to the program, resulting in 88,000 acres of national forestland being replanted in California. Contributions are used today to prepare plantation sites for new trees and for planting seedlings grown in Forest Service nurseries throughout the state. Seedlings are grown from local seeds and acorns, then they are replanted near the areas where the seeds were collected, which improves their chance of survival. As a Club, District or an Individual we can make a difference to our National Forests here in California. This year we have seen some of the worst fire storms in California history. A donation to the Penny Pines project is an easy way to help your local forests for years to come. You can even donate in honor of or in memory of someone who is special to you. A donation to Penny Pines makes a great birthday or anniversary gift and it even makes a great gift for a new baby.

All of your donations are acknowledged in *Golden Gardens eNews* each month by District. You can also see the monthly totals for donations as well as year to date totals. (See Page 7) Your donation will help bring life back to our National Forests, and yes – together we can all make a difference.
