Chula Vista Garden Club Hosts Environmental School

The Living Coast Discovery Center was the perfect location to hold courses #3 and #4 of the National Garden Clubs, Inc. Environmental School. The sights and sounds of the coastal plants and rescued animals added to the allure and serenity of this coastal wetlands area.

The stated mission of the Environmental Schools is to teach environmental literacy to cherish, protect, and conserve the living earth. Through these courses, participants learn environmental literacy and appreciation of the natural world, as well as the interrelation of all nature. Emphasis is placed on land conservation, water conservation, and air quality.

Twenty-four participants, two from as far away as North Carolina, enjoyed the learning and interaction between the instructor, Professor Mark Valen, and class members, all of whom were surprised to learn that waste is actually a human invention. In the plant and animal world, everything is used, primarily as part of the food chain.

One of the major challenges going forward is supplying fresh water to an ever-growing population. In some third world countries, mothers and their children spend the major part of their day locating and hauling water, much of it unclean and even toxic. Another example is the San Diego basin which houses three plus million people, with another three million in Tijuana in an area with a water supply to support 12,000. Think about this the next time you leave the water running while brushing your teeth. Becoming good stewards of our earth means heightening our awareness and becoming more in tune with nature.

Completers of all four courses may become Environmental Consultants, as recognized by the National Garden Clubs, Inc., and CGCI. More importantly participants will come away with a deep understanding of the natural world and the importance of working together as we face the many climate challenges ahead.

PLEASE NOTE THE NEW CGCI AWARD CHANGE

CGCI will now only recognize the first, second, third and honorable mention yearbooks in each class, in accordance with the American System of Judging. Only these yearbooks will receive ribbons and certificates. CGCI will no longer give blue ribbons to all yearbooks that score 92+.

As in the past, the first place winner in each class will receive \$50, and the winning year-book will be forwarded to Pacific Region Garden Clubs, Inc. for further competition. If your club's yearbook goes on for further judging, your club may be asked to supply an additional copy of the yearbook to be displayed at the CGCI convention (not mandatory). Please note that only one copy of your yearbook is required for judging.

SPECIAL RECOGNITION:

All yearbooks scoring a 90 or more (a 90+) will receive special recognition!

It is the hope of the 2019-2021 Awards Committee that this new procedure will prevent the confusion and questions that have taken place in the past regarding the actual first place (blue ribbon) winning yearbooks in each category.

Before you finalize your club yearbook, please see the criteria that the yearbook judges will rely upon when judging your yearbook. How's Your Blue Star Memorial Looking? Something like this, and you would like it to look brand new again?

We have information that may be of interest to you. With ten years of experience, Thomas Stelling, owner of Historical Markers Restorations, has perfected restoring bronze markers. He lives in Daytona Beach, FL, but is willing to come west to restore our Blue Star Memorial Markers in the

Pacific Region. He has already returned home for the year, but would travel to the west coast next spring if there were enough markers to restore to make it worth his time.

He charges \$750 to restore the large Highway Markers and \$250 for the smaller By-Way markers. He does the Highway Markers wherever they are located. The By-Way markers need to be unmounted and brought to a location where he is working on a large Highway Marker. To see before and after pictures, you can look at his web site, http://www.historicalmarkersrestorations.com.

Perhaps your Club or District is interested in placing a new marker. There are three types of Markers. A BS Highway Marker (cost is \$1,580) is placed on a Dedicated Blue Star Memorial Highway and a BS Memorial Marker (same cost) can be placed on the grounds of a National Cemetery, Veterans Administration Center or where any military connection is appropriate. The By-Way Marker (cost is \$510) can be placed in areas such as parks, civic and historical grounds.

CGCI has a small amount budgeted for refurbishing markers. You may submit a grant for up to \$200 to refurbish a large marker. Your State Blue Star Chairmen would like to start a list of markers that could be restored this next spring. Tom has indicated he could start on the markers next April or May. Please let either one of us know what size of marker you want refurbished and where it is located. If you have any questions, please just ask!
