From the Paradise Garden Club - an update

The first official project for the Paradise Garden Club took place on Saturday, December 29, 2018 when five members of the club planted some 350 hyacinth bulbs at the corner of Skyway and Neal. President Ward Habriel outlined what will become an arrow-shaped bed of white hyacinths pointing toward town as a sign of hope and encouragement to the community. There are future plans to repeat this planting at Clark and Pentz Roads. A sign is in the making that will read "Paradise Garden Club - watch us bloom!" to let everyone know PGCI is here to stay!

The Foster Triangle, a club project for several years, is an interesting situation post-fire. We thought the fire had demolished it but upon closer inspection, the Ponderosa Pine, one of the three semi-mature trees, still has green needles at its top (which is only 12 feet above the ground). Almost two months now after the burn I have every reason to believe that it's a survivor. The Dogwood, which we love, is scorched but the twigs still have sap. Another survivor? The Redbud, which we love less, is much like the Dogwood-darn it. Time will tell.

The smaller plants (like the Fringeflower, Euphorbias, Coreopsis, Velvet Centaurea, Helichrysum, Juniper, and Nandina) all got fried. And the "Pink Crystals" red-tinted grass planted less than a month ago, just disappeared. On the other hand, the Blue Fescue grass came through the fire saying "It was nice to be warm for a few hours." The base plants, Prostrate Manzanita, which have been there since time began, burned quite well but might survive because of their fairly deep roots. A couple dozen white hyacinths have been planted as a symbol of rebirth and they might look nice with the daffys just starting to break ground in the Triangle.

Internet Security...an update By Jane McKee, Communications Director

Happy 2019! But the coming of a new year brings with it the reminder that the hackers, phishers and spoofers are still out there and hard at work to try to steal your personal information and/or entice you to send them money.

Are there technical means available to thwart the bad

guys? Probably, but beware because the "solution" may turn out to be a scam. The most effective deterrent is to be VIGILANT and learn to recognize those false and misleading messages that flood our electronic inboxes.

Please share the following information with your members.

- **Hacker**: one who is skilled at literally breaking into email, websites or systems and taking the information, many times without the owner being aware that anything is wrong.
- **Phisher/phishing:** sending out messages asking for help or offering a deal too good to be true ("free money!" or wanting to share their lottery winnings with YOU!)... all you need to do is provide them with your bank account information!
- Spoofer/Spoofing is the forgery of an e-mail header so that the message appears to have originated from someone or somewhere other than the actual source. Distributors of spam often use spoofing in an attempt to get recipients to open, and possibly even respond to, their solicitations; again usually asking for money and/or financial information.
 - If you receive an email that appears to be from CGCI or a CGCI officer and it looks suspicious, call the individual to find out if it is legitimate...DO NOT respond directly to the email.

Please note that **CGCI WILL NEVER REQUEST THAT YOU SPEND MONEY** on its behalf. All CGCI expenditures are done through official channels via the Financial Secretary and Treasurer.

- Emails asking you to purchase items or donate to a specific cause "on behalf" of CGCI are fraudulent and you should never take action.
- Emails asking you to "pay a vendor x dollars" are fraudulent. Note if these appear to come from someone within your local organization be sure to check with the purported sender.
- Pay attention to the "sending" email address. In many cases the email address displayed is not even close to an "official" address and can easily be identified as fraudulent.
 - ◊ Following is a recent example:

Migliore <info@presidentexecutive.com>

Obviously the "@presidentexecutive.com" is NOT a CGCI address

- NEVER click on any link in a suspicious email
- Report the email as spam or phishing to your email provider (most have a link somewhere in the email account)

Attention Consultants

NGC Consultants are those garden club members who have completed NGC's Environmental, Gardening, or Landscape Design Schools. To maintain good standing they must attend a refresher at least every five years, but can refresh for credit as often as once per year. Since there has been little opportunity to refresh so far in the new year, virtually all of California's Consultants in good standing are eligible to refresh now. Environmental Consultants may refresh at any of the four courses of the Environmental School in Chula Vista this year and also at the March 30 Tri-Refresher in Colfax. The Colfax Tri-Refresher (see information below) is the only scheduled opportunity for Gardening and Landscape Design Consultants to refresh in California this year. Those whose good standing dates only run through 2019 must refresh this year or lose their Consultant status.

So, all Gardening and Landscape Design Consultants can head to Colfax for a day of education (as well as Environmental Consultants not refreshing in Chula Vista) and those Consultants due to lapse this year should head to Colfax. February in the garden....(excerpted from *Sunset Magazine*)

 Order seeds, such as pepper, pumpkin, tomato, and zucchini, for spring and summer vegetables gardens.

- ♥ Start seeds of beets, carrots, collards, fava beans, kale, leeks, lettuce, parsley, peas, rutabaga, spinach, and turnip.
- Grow rhubarb from bare root. It prefers acidic soil and cold temperatures, so try growing one plant in a very large pot in the coldest part of your garden, such as the base of a slope where cold air drains. Prune away frost damaged leaves and stems once your garden's last frost date is past.
- ♥ Cut back ornamental grasses before new growth starts.
- Fertilize citrus and avocado along the coast. Use a granular organic fertilizer and follow label directions.
- If your cymbidium orchids are bulging out of their containers or the bark has decomposed, it's time to repot them. Do this between mid-February and early July to assure bloom next season. Remove old bark, cut off dead roots, and discard soft or rotted bulbs. Repot the plant into a larger container, or divide plants into groups of three to five pseudobulbs (bulbs with leaves). Replant in medium-size bark or purchase a cymbidium mix.
- Give your sweetheart a valentine that will live on long after February 14. Tie a red ribbon around a lemon tree or put a bow on a bareroot rose. Or choose a flowering plant that can go outdoors after bloom is through. Choices include azaleas, camellias, carnations, gardenias, and Oriental lilies.
