Reforestation and Restoration Update

I became chairman of the Reforestation and Restoration Restricted Fund in 2009. Since that year \$14,120.09 has been donated by clubs, individuals, and districts who wanted to support special projects in California National Forests.

From 2009 to 2013, \$7000 in donations were collected. Three projects were completed. A greenhouse and water system in Sequoia National Forest has been completed. Repair of the CGCI sign in the Education Grove in Big Basin Redwoods State Park has been completed.

When the California National Forest Service refused our donations, \$7120.09 remained in the restricted fund. Donors from 2014-2019 were contacted and asked to redirect their donations to CGCI projects.

A moratorium on Reforestation and Restoration funds was approved and the account was closed. A letter was sent to the 23 clubs and districts affected by the closure. The donors were asked to choose between CGCI projects or the return of their donation.

The \$7,120.09 was reallocated from the Reforestation and Restoration Restricted Fund to four CGCI projects: Anza Borrego \$1925, the President's Project at San Bruno Mountain State Park \$350, Project Mission Blue \$200, and the Sempervirens fund at Big Basin Redwoods State Park \$2009.09. Four donors requested return totaling \$2,636.00.

Thank you for allowing me to be of service to CGCI and the California National Forests.

Give your Dishwater a 2nd Life

In January, the Lake Oroville Area GC had a presentation about Paradise, and it touched on using grey water. It prompted me to ask "Do you recycle your dishwater?"

For pioneer women, water was precious; they re-used their laundry and dishwater to water their gardens. If you had to pump and haul water, you made it do double-duty!

Growing up in the desert, water was expensive, and conserving it was crucial. Our washing machine water discharged into a pipe that was routed to a ditch adjacent to a row of trees. Because of that, those trees thrived! And it saved labor; you didn't have to move the hose from tree to tree.

It might seem like a drop in a bucket, but you can give your dishwater a second or third use. If you've just made dishwater and it gets cold, rewarm it in a pan. Slightly dirty water can be used to presoak dirty clothing, run your disposal, or flush your toilet. Saved in a bucket, you can wash your plant pots, clean your tires & wheel covers, or wash off areas of your patio. There are many more uses. Once the water gets really dirty, throw it out under a tree or on a bare spot in your yard. Your shrubs won't complain and the mild soap will deter insects.

Remember California's many years of drought? It takes years to recharge the water tables. Water prices have increased dramatically and choosing to use the washer and dishwasher means we consume a lot more water. Multiply that by the millions of people in California. In recent years, washing machines and toilets have been improved so that they use less water. But the fact remains that the more water we pull out of the aquifers, the more rain it takes to replenish that source.

Lastly, don't forget the slogan: Reduce, Reuse, Recycle, and Repurpose. Doing the above counts as all four of those.

Best "Green" Recipe Award

Italian Garden Soup By Palma Lindsay, Divide Garden Club

• 5 cloves garlic2 T organic olive oil

1/2 cup carrots (chopped)

1/2 tsp. fresh rosemary (chopped)

- Ingredients from my garden:
- 1 med. red onion (chopped)
- 1 med. yellow onion (chopped)
- 1 T fresh thyme
- 1 fresh oregano
- 2 fresh sage leaves (chopped)
- 1 acorn squash

Ingredients from local growers, vineyards or farmers markets:

- 1/4 tsp. fennel seeds
- 1/2 tsp. caraway seeds
- 2 T ghee (or butter)
- Pinch of red chili flakes6 oz. red wine or port
- 1/3 cup dried barley

- 1 qt. vegetable broth 1 cup tomato sauce (we can our own tomatoes)
 - 1 stalk of broccoli
- 2 med. Tomatoes (chopped)
- 1 cup kale (chopped)
- 1/2 cup arborio rice
- Grated hard cheese (such as Parmesan) or soft goat cheese

Additional: 1/2 tsp. salt; 1/4 tsp fresh ground pepper; pinch of onion powder; 1 cup (or less) water Process: Cut the top and bottom off of the acorn squash; cut it in half; remove the seeds; drizzle it with olive oil and 4 cloves of garlic, half of the salt, pepper, red chili flakes, a pinch of onion powder and the rosemary. Bake at 350° until fork tender.

In a large pot, sauté the fennel seeds and caraway seeds in the ghee until tempered (when seeds begin to crack), Add the red and yellow onions and slowly simmer until onions caramelize. Add the salt, pepper, thyme, oregano, sage leaves and red chili flakes and reduce by 1/2. Add the chopped mushrooms, carrots, zucchini, wine and bring to a boil and deglaze the mixture scraping the bottom. Mince the remaining clove of garlic and add it to the pot. Add the barley and rice and stir. Chop the roasted garlic from the acorn pan and add it to the mixture with the vegetable broth, tomato sauce and broccoli. Scoop the acorn squash from the peel and add it along with up to 1 cup of water (taste the soup; you might need less). Add any additional amounts of herbs previously used to taste. Simmer to heat through and serve with grated cheese and slice of your favorite Italian bread.

Project Mission Blue - Phase II

CGCI was fortunate to have Price Sheppy from *Golden Gate National Parks Conservancy* (GGNPC) at the 2020 Winter Board Meeting in Long Beach. Price's presentation to the Board of Directors included an update on the various methods of propagation success for the twelve nectar plants in Phase II as well as the overall population of the federally endangered mission blue butterflies. Upon conclusion of his report, CGCI presented a check to GGNPC for \$1,000 representing the charitable donations received from clubs, districts and individuals that financially support Phase II.



California Phacelia (*Phacelia californica*) pictured here is one of the twelve nectar plants being propagated in Phase II.

It is a good sprawling, hairy ground cover that favors rocky slopes, coastal bluffs and grasslands along the northern and central California coast. This native perennial blooms spring into summer and produces papery lavender flowers in slightly coiled clusters above

clumps of crinkled, silvery leaves. Nectar is favored by hummingbirds, bees and butterflies; songbirds eat the seeds. It is a great addition to native pollinator gardens.

Thank you to Vista Garden Club and West Valley Garden Club who chose to transfer their Reforestation Fund donations to this state project as well as Pacifica Garden Club in honor of CGCI President, Shane Looper. \$300 has been received since last reported in the January issue. The grand total of your generosity since July 1, 2016 is \$5,383 for Phase II.
