Project Mission Blue - Phase II

As this project approaches its conclusion in June 2021, we appreciate the generous contributions from President Shane Looper, San Pedro Garden Club and Walnut Creek Garden Club received since the January issue. \$6,243 has been raised since Phase II began July 1, 2016 to propagate twelve native nectar plants. Since the federally endangered mission blue butterfly is a poor flyer, the adults need these nectar sources as it fights for survival in the remaining fragments of its native Bay Area grasslands containing silver, summer or varied lupines - the only plants mission blue caterpillars can eat.

Preserving mission blue habitat protects other members of the grassland ecosystem, like birds, mammal and wildflowers as well. Restoring grasslands includes propagating and planting these twelve native nectar plants that a variety of adult butterfly species enjoy in addition to the mission blue butterfly.

Monardella villosa (Coyote Mint) featured here are free-flowering perennials that are long-lived in semi-dry conditions including dry slopes, rock gardens or containers. Lavender to rose-purple tubular flowers with dense heads rise above aromatic gray-green leaves.



This native nectar plant grows easily from Humboldt to San Luis Obispo counties enjoying full sun in well-drained soil. Its height is 1-2 feet with a spread of 1-2 feet and is drought-tolerant. Removing spent flowers improves their appearance and prolongs their season of bloom. Cutting plants back in fall or winter promotes denser growth for the following year. Coyote mints are excellent combined with buckwheats, penstemons and other drought-tolerant plants.

CGCI continues to be grateful for your financial support assisting the survival of the mission blue butterfly. Mail distribution:

CGCI uses two bulk mail services:

Vertical Response: distribution of all newsletters (Golden Gardens eNews, Council Thymes, WACONIAH and selected NGC publications). Annually new CGCI board members and newly elected club presidents are automatically added. Individuals may subscribe using the form on the CGCI website. If you do not wish to receive the newsletters you may simply "unsubscribe."

Mail Chimp: all "official" correspondence (Call to meetings, minutes, special announcements and reminders). Depending on the type of communication the mailing list is divided into CGCI Board members or presidents and/or treasurers of member organizations. If you "unsubscribe" from this listing you will no longer receive official CGCI communications.

If you believe that you are NOT receiving mail from CGCI and did not "unsubscribe" check your SPAM or TRASH folders. Every email provider allows users to "white list" email addresses to prevent them from being blocked. Check your settings to see how your email account works. Example: You may add an address to your address book, or create a filter indicating that a specific email address is not to be deleted, blocked or sent to spam. All CGCI mail originates from this email address: cgci@cagardenclubs.org.

History of the Marine Monument Garden at Park Semper Fi

In June of 2005, soon after being installed as President of the San Clemente Garden Club, I reviewed the New President's binder and came across a grant that was being offered featuring a civic development project honoring those who serve our country.

The community of San Clemente was in the process of designing and creating a tribute to the Marine Corp. I contacted Wayne Eggleston, founder of the Heritage of San Clemente Foundation and driving force behind the Marine Memorial Monument. Wayne was thrilled that the garden club was willing to participate in the design, planting and maintenance of the gardens around the monument.

With the exciting potential of our club contributing to this major community project, I approached our Executive Committee and was given the support to pursue this project. Club members were asked to participate in the design and implementation of the gardens which needed to be completed before the November 12, 2005 dedication date. A daunting task!

The ground breaking ceremony was held on September 7, 2005 which included the City Council, Marines and the San Clemente Garden Club among other contributors to the project.

On October 20, 2005 the Club organized a planting day and invited the Marines and community to participate. Club members, Marines, and community volunteers took this bare plot of land and through the process of design and planting, created a beautiful native garden that attracts butterflies and hummingbirds.

The Marine Monument was dedicated on November 12, 2005 at a ceremony organized by the Heritage of San Clemente Foundation to commemorate the 230th birthday of the US Marine Corp.

In March of 2006, our club was awarded a \$2000 grant sponsored by National Garden Clubs. The club matched the funds and major plantings began. In May, our club was presented an appreciation plaque by Mayor Wayne Eggleston. On July 4th, club members served as docents in the gardens during the fireworks celebration at the pier.

The Marine Monument Garden Project of the San Clemente Garden Club started out as an idea that the Club could become a significant part in creating this tribute to the Marine Corp. The significance and emotional impact on the community and neighboring Camp Pendleton has far exceeded the expectations of the original idea for the Marine Monument at Park Semper Fi.
