2019-2021 President's Project

Our gratitude to Adele Kelly, Chula Vista Garden Club in honor of Sandy Duncan and Southern California Garden Club for their generous donations to the San Bruno Mountain Botanical Garden restoration project. Total donations received to date are \$14,450 with \$5,550 still needed to reach the \$20,000 goal for this President's Project.

CGCI recently remitted half of the plant propagation expenses (\$6,000) to *San Bruno Mountain Watch* that operates *Mission Blue Nursery*'s for production costs related to 70 of the 100 species needed for this project. They grow native plants exclusively from seed and cuttings collected by permit on *San Bruno Mountain* and provides these for restoration projects such as the *San Bruno Mountain Botanical Garden* project.



Project Mission Blue - Phase II

We thank **Santa Rosa Garden Club** and **Southern California Garden Club** for their generous donations received since the October 2020 issue. Since Phase II began July 1, 2016, we have raised **\$5,943** to propagate twelve native nectar plants to help the federally endangered mission blue butterfly. The adult butterflies who are typically poor flyers, use these nectar sources in between patches of host larval lupine plants.

Achillea millefolium (Yarrow) featured here is one of the twelve nectar plants supported by this project. In full sun, this perennial grows 1-2 feet in height and 2-3 feet in width. It has finely dissected, aromatic foliage with flat clusters of showy, white or pink flowers in late spring to early summer, attracting butterflies and

bees. Cutting back spent flower stems will extend the flowering season as well as improve appearance. Yarrow can be used in mixed borders or meadows. It is drought-tolerant; adaptable to a variety of soils throughout California, and usually deer-resistant.

Wildlife-Friendly Backyards

This year, seven Roseville Better Gardens Club members applied to the National Wildlife Federation to have their yards designated as Certified Wildlife Habitats. One member completed the process earlier. The individuals found the process super easy. Signs to show the yards are certified are available for purchase. And, each individual receives a magazine subscription with membership.

These individuals' yards vary in size from a small residential lot with a Koi pond to a five-acre lot with a fresh stream running through it. Some members added additional food, water and nesting places. All the yards have a variety of trees and plants that attract wildlife.

The members helped wildlife on the federal level, and they increased their knowledge and appreciation of the wildlife that visit their yards. The enjoyment and excitement of watching so many species visit and make these yards their home is rewarding and comforting.

The requirements for eligibility to have a garden certified are simple, and most gardeners across the nation would qualify.

Per the National Wildlife Federation all you need to do is confirm you have the following:

At least three (3) food sources.

One (1) water source.

Two (2) places for cover.

Two (2) places to raise their young.

Sustainable practices: soil and water conservation, control exotic plants and pest management, and organic practices.

Rose Care

After all the Christmas rush and the Bah-Humbug of 2020 in general, I am thinking about my spring garden, especially my 60+ roses as they need advanced tender loving care.

Pruning Time - My goal is to get my roses pruned by Super Bowl Sunday for a mid-April/early-May bloom. If the weather is cooler the main flush of bloom could be delayed to mid-May. If pruning is delayed later than early February you could run into hot weather and the blooms won't be of superior quality. Pruning is okay <u>before</u> Super Bowl Sunday; however don't apply fertilizer until February as a late cold snap could damage the new growth.

Pruning Process – On all roses cut out all dead wood. Cut out the weakest of any crossing branches. If your roses are grafted, keep cuts above the graft union. Hybrid Teas and Floribunda bushes can be pruned down to 3-5 main canes of 2-3 feet high. Miniature roses can get out of hand too; prune to fit the container or area where planted.

Eliminate Disease – I don't like using chemical sprays, so it is important to clean up around the roses after pruning. If your rose leaves have black spot or rust strip them off and burn or trash—do not compost.

Mulch – Apply or reapply mulch to protect from the cold and heat and conserve water. (Roses like lots of water.)

I recommend mulch that will decompose in a couple of years as it helps improve the soil.

Fertilize – Roses are heavy feeders. Feed roses after pruning. Organic fertilizer is best for improving the soil, however organics are generally more costly than chemical fertilizer and the roses don't care. Feed roses monthly February through June. Do not fertilize during the hot summer months, do a final feeding in October.

Other maintenance – Deadhead roses as needed. Make a clean cut below the spent bloom at a healthy node with 3-5 leaves.
