Know and Use Your Parliamentary Tools

At the recent virtual Fall Board Meeting of California Garden Clubs, Inc. (CGCI), President Lynne Batchelor visited some of the committee meetings to thank members for their service and to benefit from the knowledge of what committees are doing and to be able to provide input in some cases. This has not been done much, maybe not at all, in recent years. Of course, historically we have had in-person state meetings and it is arguably harder to sit in on committee meetings at in-person meetings where two or three different meetings may be going on at the same time.

Being a long-time NGC board member, I know that NGC presidents have a history of dropping in on committee meetings to thank members for their service, and more recently because of Zoom to sit in on full meetings.

CGCI provides in its bylaws that "the president shall be an ex-officio member of all committees except the nominating committee." This is a very standard provision for many organizations, including many or most garden clubs. If the organization's bylaws do contain such a provision the president is not counted in the quorum for the committee, but "without exception, ex-officio



members of boards and committees have exactly the same rights and privileges as do all other members, including, of course, the right to vote." The president does not have the obligation to participate in the proceedings of the committees, but has the right to participate in the work of committees. Such provision means that the president may attend committee meetings without any special invitation to attend.

Taking advantage of this privilege when it is provided in an organization's bylaws can assist presidents who function as the chief executive officers of their organizations to better understand the work of the organization and can provide an opportunity to exercise leadership over the direction of the organization, as well as the opportunity to interact and work with board members. Of course, presidents should try to exercise impartiality and avoid micro-managing.

Bats: A Love Story

Who ever knew that bats were cute? Or that they resemble chihuahuas? Those who attended a recent meeting of the River Valley Garden Club now know that not only are they cute, they are important pollinators, they eat insects, and they are the fastest mammal on the planet with the ability to fly over one hundred miles per hour.

JoEllen Arnold, a bat expert who has traveled to six continents studying bat behavior, shared that bats control insects, are important seed dispersers, and interestingly there is not a single blind bat in the world. In fact, they have better eyesight than humans. Furthermore, since their noses are much more sensitive than humans or most animals, strong scents tend to scare them off – scents like cinnamon, eucalyptus, cloves, mint, and peppermint. Now you know what to put up in your rafters if you don't want bats to roost in your house.

Here is a new word for your vocabulary: chiropterophily. Although it sounds like a condition that could be cured by a quick visit to a chiropractor, it is actually the official term for pollination by bats. Bats typically pollinate tropical or desert flowers that are white or pale, nocturnal, and bloom at night. Of significant importance is that bats pollinate the agave plant, which is the principal ingredient of the margarita — an all-time favorite summer drink. So please say "cheers" and "thank you" to bats the next time you are enjoying a margarita with a little umbrella beside a swimming pool.

Along with so many other of our animal friends, our bats are in decline. For one thing, they are slow reproducers, birthing only one pup per year. They have also been negatively affected by climate change, human ignorance, habitat destruction, disease, and wind turbines. The key to their very survival is human understanding of their importance in our environment and the willingness to provide habitats for their continued existence.

And let's dispel the rumor surrounding bats and vampires. There are three species of bats that do, indeed, feed on blood; however, it wasn't until the late 1800's when Dracula was popularized that the myth of bats turning into vampires came to be. In reality, they're cute little mammals that are an integral part of our environment and do their share to eat insects, pollinate certain species, and ensure that we have an unlimited supply of margaritas.


Book Recommendation

The introduction includes sections such as "The Diversity of Birds," "Movement," "Physiology" and many more, followed by two-page spreads of 84 different birds, complete with his incredibly beautiful and detailed drawings. These two sections are intimately connected with notated references to links between a general bird fact in the first section, and a detail in the 2- page spread. For example, the first paragraph of "The Diversity of Birds" starts with "Birds are dinosaurs" followed by a notation to refer to the bottom of page 81, the Roadrunner page, where he provides details about how dinosaurs and birds are connected. Every time I open this book, I learn something new!
