Changes are coming over the next year and ALL Clubs and Associate Plant Societies should take note:

- **DUES:** Effective July 1, 2016, CGCI dues will increase to \$2.75 per capita. This is the result of NGC's dues increase from 50c to \$1.00 per member. The \$2.75 paid to CGCI includes the dues to NGC.
- INSURANCE: Effective February 15, 2016, the liability insurance premiums for the 2016-17 insurance year will be \$1.50 per capita (minimum \$20). Additional Insured Certificates remain \$30 each. All other fees remain unchanged.

DEALING WITH DROUGHT

Following are a few suggestions for handling these challenging conditions. YOUR tips and tricks are welcome!

 Use "greywater" (gently used water from sinks, showers and laundries) for outdoor irrigation except on edible plants.

Go to http://greywateraction.org for ideas and instructions.

- Use bubblers in "green" areas to reduce evaporation.
- ♦ Mulch, mulch, mulch
- Use "local" native plants that can handle the temperature. fluctuations and benefit wildlife.
- Consider "drought-friendly" recipes...use ingredients that require less water to grow or cook with. Check out

- ♦ Try steaming rather than boiling.
- Water used to cook veggies (once cooled) can be used to irrigate plants...just think of the nutrients!

Tech Tips



Concerned about ID theft? Some things to consider:

- * Change passwords often.
- * Don't use the same password for more than one account.
- Be creative mix letters and numbers (DO NOT use your pet's name or grandchild's birthdate).
- Create a separate email account for online shopping...one that has no similarity to your "personal" account.
- * Turn your computer completely off when not in use.

Horticulture Happenings

Invasive plants and some alternatives (courtesy PlantRight.org): INVASIVE:

Green fountain grass (Pennisetum setaceum) grows up to five feet tall in large clumps of long, narrow leaves with foxtail-like plumes in the summer. This invasive form of fountain grass has been observed invading deserts, grasslands and coastal areas. It has been reported as a major problem in 10 California state parks. It increases fuel load and therefore the frequency, intensity and spread of fire — and it quickly re-establishes in dense clumps after fires. Green fountain grass can become dominant in grasslands within two to three years if no control measures are employed. Fortunately for gardeners, the purple form of fountain grass is not invasive.

Non-Invasive ALTERNATIVES (just a few of many alternatives):

- California fescue (Festuca californica)
- Pine muhly (Muhlenbergia dubia)
- Oriental fountain grass (Pennisetum orientale)
- Purple fountain grass (Pennisetum setaceum 'Rubrum') note: this is a sterile cultivar

He is also a member of the National Association of Parliamentarians and California State Association of Parliamentarians (CSAP) and is an officer in his local unit of CSAP.

Greg says: "I think what I like most about garden club is the constant opportunity to learn and travel."





NGC President's Project: "Service in Action"

The project is intended to increase awareness of the seriousness of the demise of pollinators and amphibians and encourage conservation and protection efforts by clubs, the general public and governmental agencies.

Often called the first bio-indicators; amphibians and pollinators, by their presence, abundance, and activities reveal the state of their ecosystems. Pollinator and amphibian populations are declining worldwide



through the effects of pesticides, habitat destruction, diseases, parasites, global warming, and introduced predators. Education, habitat conservation, and protection of at risk populations are issues we can change through our actions.

The Million Pollinator Garden Challenge

Because of its renowned reputation, and the strength of membership, NGC has been invited to be a founding Gardening and Habitat Planting Partner of the National Pollinator Garden Network, recently formed to help establish one million gardens to assist in restoring critical pollinator population recovery in the United States. Over the next two years, The Network will bring together the science and garden capabilities of industry with the outreach of nongovernmental organizations to empower a million private citizens and organizations to plant pollinator gardens nationwide.

This is an unprecedented collaboration and our members will be providing food and habitat for pollinators in our home gardens (can even be a container on a deck or a condo window planter), as well as our public garden projects, youth garden projects, nursing homes, botanical gardens, business areas, and government offices. Monetary awards will be available for our member clubs, and we plan to coordinate grants to clubs that will plant pollinator gardens with our youth! It is SO important



to teach our youth how to take care of our land, our wildlife, our food supply for the future! Who will teach them if we don't!?
