

The rediscovery of both the Charlotte M. Hoak Pygmy Forest and the Pygmy Forest National Natural Landmark at Jug Handle will be celebrated. The committee has made an effort to schedule these events so that CGCI members can attend on their way home from the Fall Board meeting.

What is a "pygmy forest"? The "blacklock" soil produces dwarf cypress not more than nine or ten inches high, as well as the California Bishop Pine that is characterized by its prodigious number of cones that hang on the tree for up to 30 or 40 years. Growing amongst the trees are huckleberry bushes, ferns, lilies, rhododendrons and a variety of evergreen shrubs.



In the Garden this month...

Excerpt from San Diego Union-Tribune

Vince Lazaneo (UC Extension)

 Tomatoes, peppers and beans are warm season crops, but their flowers may drop when the temperature soars and you will have less fruit to harvest. Keeping soil adequately moist on these crops can help reduce flower drop but some loss may still occur if the temperature remains high for a prolonged period.

Tomatoes

 Temperatures above 90 degrees can prevent pollination of flowers on tomatoes and cause them to drop.
 Excessive heat damages the pollen and may dry out the sticky surface on the female part of the flower so pollen is not held there. Some tomato varieties tolerate more heat than others, and these may be more productive in inland areas.

Peppers

Peppers are even more temperamental about temperature when it comes to fruiting. Blossoms will not set when night temperatures are much below 60 degrees or above 75 degrees. Blossoms also will drop when day temperatures remain above 90 degrees for a period of time.

Beans

• Flowers can drop on snap beans (also called green or string beans) and on lima beans when the temperature remains above 90 degrees. The harvest can also be reduced by soil that is too dry or constantly wet and by high ozone. Some bush type snap beans are more heat tolerant than pole beans. Bush beans produce fewer pods in a more concentrated harvest lasting two to three weeks compared with four to six weeks for pole beans. The harvest season on bush beans can be extended by making successive plantings three to four weeks apart.

Mark your calendar!

- Renewal Packets
- ♦ In mid-September, renewal packets for the 2017/2018 fiscal year will be sent out <u>via email</u>. All documents included in the renewal packet email will also be posted on our website. Renewal packets will only be mailed via USPS upon special request.
- Please don't wait until the last minute.
- ♦ February 1 is the renewal deadline and please don't wait until then to submit your renewal application and required reports. Frequently, submitted renewal applications are incomplete or inaccurate and additional time is required to process before renewal approval.

Don't risk your tax-exempt status!

• All clubs are required to file annual reports with the Internal Revenue Service (IRS) and the Franchise Tax Board (FTB). When your fiscal year is July 1 to June 30, your IRS 990-N ePostcard and FTB 199-N ePostcard (or 990, 990-EZ or 199) are due by November 15.

ATTENTION ALL Presidents, District Directors & Treasurers

- ⇒ The Internal Revenue Service (IRS) has changed the registration requirements and process for nonprofit organizations to submit IRS Form 990-N online.
- ⇒ You MUST re-register in 2016 before you file the 990-N (this applies whether you are a member of GTEP or have tax exempt status independently)
- ⇒ Step-by-step instructions are available to provide the assistance you need to easily overcome the challenges created by these recent changes.
- ⇒ The guidelines were recently sent to you via email.
- ⇒ If you did not receive the guidelines or need another copy
 - Go to: http://californiagardenclubs.com/
 - ◆ The link is posted to the home page and on the GTEP page
- ⇒ Remember, the GTEP renewal application requires your annual ePostcard or informational returns (whichever you file) be filed before you may complete and submit your GTEP renewal application. Document the dates because the dates filed must be included as well.





- 1. To prevent the line on your string trimmer from jamming or breaking, treat with a spray vegetable oil before installing it in the trimmer.
 - To have garden twine handy when you need it, just stick a ball of twine in a small clay pot, pull the end of the twine through the drainage hole, and set the pot upside down in the garden. Do that, and you'll never go looking for twine again.
- 3. The next time you boil or steam vegetables, don't pour the water down the drain, use it to water potted patio plants, and you'll be amazed at how the plants respond to the "vegetable soup."
- 4. The quickest way in the world to dry herbs: just lay a sheet of newspaper on the seat of your car, arrange the herbs in a single layer, then roll up the windows and close the doors. Your herbs will be quickly dried to perfection. What's more, your car will smell great.
