Campo de Cahuenga Re-enactment of Treaty By Martha Smyser

Did you know that we live close to one of the most significant sites in California history? On a rainy January 13, 1847 Andres Pico, the Governor of Alta California and John C. Fremont signed a treaty which ended hostilities between Mexico and the United States and led to the Treaty of Guadalupe Hidalgo in which Mexico ceded California, Nevada, Utah, New Mexico, most of Arizona and Colorado and parts of Oklahoma, Kansas and Wyoming to the United States. It has been several years



since there has been a reenactment of the 1847 signing but this coming January 15, 2023 there will be a celebration at the park in Studio City. The park will be open from noon until 4 PM and the ceremonies start at 1:30 PM. In past years District garden clubs have provided wreaths made of local and/or natural materials for display at the park.
