## When old is new again.....

Over the last few years many have become more mindful of their impact on our environment. This has led people to consider not only how to conserve water during times of drought or how to grow their own food or share extra food, but how to reduce plastics and all waste from going in our landfills. In other words, we have all begun to think more about how we reduce, reuse/re-purpose or recycle the resources we have.

Before we became a single use society, we used dishes, washing them when dirty. We had drinking fountains on school yards, water coolers at work or we took a thermos with a cool or warm beverage. We had our coffee before we left for work. We wrapped our sandwich with wax paper and carried it to school or work in a paper bag. When we did our laundry, we used powdered soap in our washers, then hung the damp clothes on the clothesline. Some are now asking.....what happened to the clothesline, should we bring back the clothesline? Using a clothesline prolongs the life of your clothes, uses no electricity or gas, gets you outside enjoying fresh air, allows sunlight to disinfect your clothes, and is better for our environment. In lieu of bringing back the clothesline, you can purchase a front loader dryer which uses less energy.

Rarely do you see people buy powdered laundry soap anymore. Today, most Americans purchase liquid laundry soap in heavy plastic bottles. Over 700 million heavy plastic laundry soap jugs end up in our landfills every year. Each of those heavy plastic laundry soap jugs take between 70-450 years to decompose. Instead of littering our landfills with heavy plastic laundry detergent jugs we can start using laundry soap pods or sheets. Both laundry soap pods and sheets dissolve in hot or cold water and work in all types of washing machines. Both are free of harsh chemicals, parabens, dyes, and phosphates. Laundry soap pod packaging is not recyclable and does pose a poisoning risk for young children if swallowed.

Laundry soap sheets are plastic free, mess free, light weight, soft and flexible. You can use a partial sheet for a small load. Next time you go to buy laundry detergent, consider laundry soap sheets, Ecofriendly, easy to use without harmful personal or environmental chemicals. There are now an assortment of laundry soap sheets available. The one I use and like, Earth Breeze, is a fragrance free laundry sheet created for sensitive skin that is easy on moderately priced and our good for our planet. Washing our clothes with our planet in mind....one of many old ideas with a new twist.


