I am happy to say that I am in my own little home. The tree I live in has been saved from the fire and the canopy only scorched. Some of my friends were not so lucky. We have had our first snow of the season. We all hope for more of the same.

The Southern Sierras cover about a quarter of California's land area. This range runs from Lake Tahoe to Tehachapi. Hundreds of my fellow forest creatures and plants call the region home. The forest helps sequester carbon and store water. What is alarming, as I live here, I see fire and drought always occurs in these landscapes. The decline is so rapid because of this, that the regrowth doesn't seem to keep up.

Thirsty trees are weaker and more susceptible to deadly attacks from bark beetles when fire and drought occur.

The big trees are the ones taking the brunt of this devastation. Wildfires once regularly simmered along the forest floors. Today's large fires are burning at high severity and searing trees on the top.

Climate change is a threat definitely. It causes irreversible damage over a period of time, and along with that, we have changing fire patterns.

My little area is better than most and I am happy to see some of my old friends: Mr. Rabbit..."Jack ", we call him, Tom the cougar, who never messes with Jack....other family members of my chipmunk family, and "Terry" the mischievous squirrel and his family. Several other friends are not around, sad to say. Hope they will find their way back home.

What Gardeners Can Do

 Increase planting areas by restricting lawn to area with foot traffic and play areas. Mow at 3-4 inches and do it less often. Taller grass needs less irrigation.

#### **Gardening with Nature** (continued)

- Plant keystone genera that support local ecosystems by feeding insects. Native oaks, cherries, willows, birches, cottonwoods, elms, goldenrods, asters, and perennial sunflowers are often good choices, but find out what is best for your area.
- Plant generously in large areas. Plant in layers: trees, understory trees, shrubs, and perennials.
- Plant for specialist pollinators. We need to support our 4,000 species of native bees.
- Network with neighbors. Share seeds and seedlings.
- Build conservation hardscapes: cover window wells, use motion detector outdoor lights at night, create bird-friendly baths with bubblers, place small bee hotels around the garden.
- Create caterpillar pupation sites under our trees. 90% of caterpillars drop to the ground pupating in the duff or burrowing into the soil.
- Avoid insecticide spraying and non-organic fertilizers and herbicides.

#### **HAPPENINGS IN THE GARDEN**



The Burbank Community gardeners began building their raised beds and improving the soil about 9 months ago on land that had seen only herbicides for more than 75 years. Look at these garden plots now! Some members have already started their second plantings, having already harvested their corn and watermelon and tomatoes from the first round of growing. Soil amendments from nearby horse stables, from worm farms, and from local chicken coops have helped turn lifeless soil into a nutrient-rich, and compost-dark growing medium for these beautiful harvests.
