NOVEMBER MEETING PROGRAM: TABLE TALK WINIFRED CREAMER

We're trying something new at the November meeting, Table Talk. Here's how it works: sit at a table by the topic card of your choice. In November, these will be:

- ---Bringing Plants Indoors
- ---Overwintering Bulbs
- --- Care of Houseplants During the Winter

On the paper provided, write a question, a tip, or a piece of advice on your table's topic. Put your paper in the center basket. Each table will have a moderator and that person will start the discussion by pulling one paper from the basket. Everyone at the table will help answer the question or discuss the tip or advice. This continues until the basket is empty or time's up.

After about twenty minutes of conversation we'll repeat the process so that everyone can change places, ask different questions, offer advice and discuss a second topic.



IN MY GARDEN- PLANTING FISH: SHELLY LUSK

One of the first things my husband and I did when we moved to Eureka was to ascertain where people purchased their seafood. So many people told us they shopped at Safeway or Winco. I was imagining there was going to be a local fish market like Pike Place Market in Seattle with burly men flinging large tunas back and forth.

But I eventually figured out how to get out to the marina and buy fish directly from the fishermen, fostering a deeper connection with one of our sources of food. And I always paid a little extra to have the fish filleted, leaving the nasty bits for the fisherman to dispose of.

But this Autumn, I decided to take a page from a Thanksgiving story I learned as a child about how the Native Americans taught the pilgrims to drop a fish in a prepared hole when growing corn to fertilize the new plant. While out buying a tuna, I



asked the fisherman if I could take the rest of the carcass home for my garden. I learned the fishermen were not supposed to be feeding the remains to the seals, and this particular fellow was glad to bag up the head and all for me to take to the garden. Furthermore, he offered me as many as

he had in his waste barrel, but my disgusted husband drew the line at "one" in our new car.

As we approach Thanksgiving, I am grateful to have this knowledge, grateful to have access to fresh fish, and grateful to have the time and space to try out gardening traditions that have been around for eons. The fish has been buried in the raised bed as I prepare for spring plantings, and I'll have to get back to you to let you know if it

was worth the effort. I'm hoping some of you will also give it a try and let me know how it goes.
