In My Garden

Time to put away the mums that decorated the house and the yard for Halloween and Thanksgiving. I clipped them to the proper length and planted them in a spare garden where I can resurrect them for the next year's holidays. Saves buying them every year and they keep just spreading out.



Now onto the holidays. The poinsettias. They cheer up anything. Forward looking bright, colorful, come in many different colors. It is an exquisite plant that cheers up a room, or the outdoors. The red are the traditional Christmas flower, Latin name "euphorbia pulcherrima". The red leaves are called "bracts" and are actually not the flower. The flower is the center of the plant's "bracts".

Officially known in California as "painted leaf", or "Mexican fire plant", it was eventually named "poinsettia" in honor of its discoverer Dr. Poinsett. Dr. Poinsett was the founder of the National Institute for the promotion of Science and the Useful Arts...the predecessor of the Smithsonian Institution. He served in the South Carolina legislature and the United States House of Representatives, as well as Secretary of War under President Martin Van Buren. He traveled extensively in Europe, Asia and Latin America.

The ancient Aztecs of Mexico cultivated and regarded this plant as a symbol of purity before Christianity came to the Western Hemisphere. The red bracts were used by them to make a reddish-purple dye used in textiles and cosmetics. Also used on skin infections after the red bracts were crushed, or they placed plant parts on a person's chest to stimulate circulation. The white milky sap, called latex, became a medicine to treat fevers,

In the early 1900's the plants were potted and sold in California, The City of Ventura, California is known as the poinsettia city. The flowers' industry was pioneered and developed by the Ecke family in the 1920's. They began growing fields of these flowers in Hollywood, Beverly Hills, and today are located in Encinitas, California.

The poinsettias now come in so many colors....what to choose, what to choose!! The holiday is not the same without them.

A Thank You from the Monarch Group



During this one-day per week watering schedule, watering on Saturdays should be done before 9:00 a.m. or after 6:00 p.m., for up to 15 minutes per irrigation station.

The Pallid Bat is California's State Bat

The Pallid Bat is California's State Bat! Senate Bill No. 732, signed into

law by the Governor on October 8, 2023, established the Pallid bat (Antrozus pallidus) as the official state bat. The bill states that bats have provided California with more than \$1 billion worth of pest control to the state's agricultural land. They have also helped reduce the state's fire risk with their consumption of bark beetles and wood borers.

According to **LAist**, these bats "can be found in the desert, oak woodlands, coastal redwood forests, and in the pine forests of the Sierra Nevada Mountains. It has tan fur, a white underbelly, large ears, a pig-like snout, small eyes, and a wingspan of up to 16 inches. The Pallid bat is preyed on by ground predators like foxes, raccoons, snakes, cats, and large amphibians. Unlike a lot of other bat species, it can catch its prey on the ground as well as in the air."
